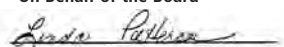

Notes to Financial Statements

For the Year Ended October 31, 2010 (Unaudited)

1. PURPOSE OF ORGANIZATION

The Block Parent Program of Canada Inc. is a registered charity that distributes public safety information across Canada through the promotion, interaction and development of educational materials and programs. The Organization is exempt from payment of income taxes under Section 149 of the *Income Tax Act*. The Organization's major sources of funding are from the Office of the Solicitor General and the Co-operators Insurance Company.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The financial statements of the Organization have been prepared in accordance with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles. Because a precise determination of many assets and liabilities is dependent upon future events, the preparation of financial statements necessarily involves the use of estimates and approximation. The financial statements have, in management's opinion, been properly prepared within reasonable limits of materiality and within the framework of the significant accounting policies summarized below:

Investments

Investments consist of Guaranteed Investment Certificates carried at cost. The funds are reinvested at maturity unless required for use in general operations or provincial programs.

Capital assets

Per CICA Handbook Section 4430 the not-for-profit organization has chosen to expense all capital expenditures as they are incurred.

Basis of presentation

The Organization follows the deferral method of accounting.

Contributed services

The work of the Organization is dependent on the service of many volunteers. Since these services are not normally purchased by the Organization and because of the difficulty in determining their fair value, contributed services are not recognized in these financial statements.

Revenue recognition

Contributions related to specific programs are recognized as revenue in the year in which the specific program expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions from sponsors for general operations are amortized into revenue on a straight line basis over the twelve month period to which they relate. All other unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

3. FINANCIAL INSTRUMENTS

The Organization's financial instruments consist of cash, accounts receivable, and accrued liabilities. Unless otherwise noted, it is management's opinion that the Organization is not exposed to significant interest, currency or credit risks arising from these financial instruments. The fair value of these financial instruments approximate their carrying values, unless otherwise noted.

6. FUNDS HELD IN TRUST

The Saskatchewan program closed in 2009; however, the funds will be held in the trust for a period of two years. If after that time the program has not restarted, then the funds will be transferred to general funds.

7. CONTRACTUAL OBLIGATIONS

The Organization is renting its office space under a long-term lease expiring March 2013. The Organization paid \$14,400 (2009 – \$14,400) for rent. The approximate amount to be paid in rent for the next year is as follows:

8. ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

The Block Parent Program has entered into agreements with several entities for sponsorship of its operations. A grant is received annually, subject to the approval of the Solicitor General of Canada, in the amount of \$22,950. As the Organization's main source of income is derived from these sponsorships, its ability to continue viable operations is dependent upon the extension of these types of sponsorship agreements.

9. LAW SUIT

In 2008, the Block Parent Program of Canada was involved in a legal dispute relating to the use of a trademark. The court decision ruled in favour of the Block Parent Program of Canada. As at year end, the Block Parent Program of Canada is still in the process of attempting to collect assets seized to attempt to collect payment.

President's Message

In 2010 the Block Parent® Program of Canada held their Annual Symposium and AGM in Calgary, AB. We had a variety of workshops, some of which were (CPTED) Crime Prevention through environmental designs by Gerry Bailey. This session made many rethink when using an ATM machine and landscaping around their homes. Another presentation was from Michele Warkenton. She brought her puppet friends Granny and Cory who visit local schools and talk about safety. This was a very entertaining presentation and one where we all were involved.

Most other sessions were based on reviewing our Program, which included updates on our new E-newsletter, web site audit and marketing strategy to mention a few. In October, our new Governor General was installed and just before the end of 2010 we received word that His Excellency The Right Honourable David Johnston had accepted our request to be our Patron.

BPPCI would like to congratulate Safer Communities Australia on their 30th Anniversary.

I would like to recognize the generous donations we received in the past year from FedNAv Ltd, London Drugs and *Style at Home* magazine.

I would like to thank our National Sponsor the Co-operators and specifically Jayne Russell for her continued support of our Program in many ways. This past year they produced a Safety Banner which Jayne unveiled at our National Symposium. Many of the Provinces and local community Programs enquired about having a banner of their own. Jayne was so pleased with the response that all the Provincial Programs as well as some local Programs received banners at no cost.

I would like to acknowledge the Department of Public Safety for their continued financial support of our Program for core funding. This year we received a two year commitment for funding.

We said good by to a member of our Board this year and I would like to thank Gail McMahon for the time she gave to our Board and wish her well with the London Program. I would also like to thank the members of the National Board Mike Byrne, Francine Chartrand, Teresa Stalis and Helen Squance for the hard work and support they have given to the Program and to me over the past year.

PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTS FOR 2010

Annual General Meeting and Training Symposium

The 2010 AGM and Training Symposium were hosted by the Alberta Block Parent® Association, and took place in Calgary, AB. A special thank you goes out to Olunda Dorward, Lynn Squance, Kathleen Dorward, Karen Mercier, Jocelan Darnel, Donna Fox and Mary Telford for donating their time and effort in making the event a success.

The Symposium centered on Reviewing the Past, Formulating the Future and Finalizing the Plan.

A marketing proposal is to be developed to address the development and implementation of an e-magazine as well as volunteer and fundraising strategies.

Strategic Plan

The marketing campaign created by the marketing consultant, Rennick, Hoppe Associates continued in the first quarter of 2010. The focus of the campaign was to increase the visibility of the Program and increase volunteer membership.

An informational package was distributed by Rennick, Hoppe Associates to 400 potential donors which included Corporations, Foundations and Unions as part of a fundraising campaign. The campaign was undertaken to increase donations and create a relationship with new funders.

A full page Public Service Announcement was placed in the June and July editions of the magazine *Style at Home*.

A breakdown of costs to prepare and distribute brochures at a classroom, school, school district level etc., was developed and placed on the National website with the view of securing additional donations.

A creative template of four different Public Service Announcements was also developed. Local Programs can send the scripts to local radio or TV to promote their Program.

National Block Parent® Week

The theme of 2010's National Block Parent® Week was "Still Here, Still Helping, Still Needed".

A new poster was created by Teresa Stalis and placed on the National website to be accessed by the local Programs and used to promote the Program. In addition, a media release was prepared and distributed nationally in French and English by newswire service.

PARTNERSHIPS

The Program is characterized by a close working relationship with police, government departments, education and other community partners. This ongoing partnership is the basis for the continued success of the Program across Canada with the National and Provincial/Territorial boards or committees having a police liaison.

The BPPCI Board of Directors is committed to working with and supporting all levels of the Program on a personal level, by providing and circulating printed materials and public service announcements and by fostering effective communication. BPPCI continues to receive requests for information on how to start a Program from within Canada. The most recent request from within Canada has come from Souris, PE. BPPCI continues to search for new partnership opportunities while fostering existing partnerships.

The National Block Parent® Program is contacted throughout the year by individuals or groups internationally who are interested in starting up a local Program. A package of background information of the Program containing helpful tips in Program start-up, forms, sample brochures etc., is distributed upon request. The most recent International request has come from London, England.

NATIONAL FUNDING

BPPCI is grateful to Public Safety Canada. The core funding provided is crucial to maintaining the viability of the Block Parent® Program in Canada.

BPPCI has again participated in the 2010 Charity Awareness Calendar. The calendar provides an opportunity to increase awareness of the Block Parent® Program. The proceeds of the calendar sales are distributed equally among the participating non-profit organizations.
